Letter From Our Minister

It's important that we celebrate Easter.

Even though it may not be for us!

The Easter story has its heart in everything that goes wrong.

The garden of Eden goes wrong, and we get the garden of Gethsemane.

The bread in the wilderness goes wrong, and we are left with the broken bread of Maundy Thursday.

The calling together of disciples goes wrong, and we are left with the breaking up of the disciples.

The shouts of hosanna from Palm Sunday go wrong, and we hear shouts of accusation.

There are lots of things that show that the stories of the gospels are set in broken lives, for broken people, in a broken period of time.

So, it is logical to say that maybe the story of Easter, while joyful for everyone, can only really connect with those who are broken:

Broken because of war in Ukraine.

Broken because of a lack of food and/or water.

Broken because of climate change.

Broken because of being caught in an abusive relationship.

Broken because of a broken body, or a broken spirit.

Broken to the core of what it is to be human.

And if we are honest... None of us would choose to be in those situations. None of us want to be in those situations, none of us want to create those situations.

But you can imagine the power of a story that starts with betrayal, conflict, pain, heartbreak, torture, and death... and then leads to new life! It's for people like this that the flow of the Easter story is so powerful.

Imagine being renewed by peace and justice in Ukraine.

Imagine being renewed by having food and water.

Imagine being renewed by a healthy relationship.

Imagine being renewed in body and or spirit.
Imagine being renewed to live life in all its fullness.

But of course, much of our lives can be spent trying to convince people that we aren't broken. When someone asks how you are today, how do you answer? Do you say "I'm fine thank you" even if you aren't! If this happens in church life, it can build an image of church being a place full of people whose lives are balanced, sorted, and trouble free. That's a church that just doesn't need Easter.

We may not be in Ukraine, we may not be starving or getting disease from poor water, we may not be in abusive relationships, and we may be living in hope...
But to get the most from Easter, we need to find where we are broken. What parts of our lives aren't perfect and aren't as complete as they should be?

When we find those areas, Easter is for us.

So we celebrate Easter for others, and we celebrate it for ourselves.

We celebrate it for all who have been broken, for all who are, and for the world. Jumping from Palm Sunday's celebrations to the joy of Easter Sunday can mean we lose out on the depth of why Easter is still relevant to me, to you, and to this broken world.

May the good news of the gospel lift us all this Easter... From whatever depth we find ourselves in. From whatever depth we know others are in.

From being tortured, dead, and buried, Christ is alive for evermore! Alleluia!!! David Downing

The New Pastorate

Since the last magazine, lots of people have been very busy!

All four churches (Maidenhead, Marlow, Windsor and Bracknell) voted to seek to form a new pastorate of the four churches. Since then, I have been to preach at Windsor and Bracknell. On those Sundays, both churches were asked to have Church Meetings when they voted on a) forming the new pastorate, and b) calling me as their minister as part of that pastorate. Both churches voted unanimously in favour. So, what happens now? What is going to change? Immediately, not much will change. All the churches' Elders will be discussing what priorities they have for me as minister. We will be trying to get the Church Secretaries to get together as well. The worship plan won't change for the foreseeable future, but I will be visiting Windsor and Bracknell for various events as we look to form a short-term strategy, and a long-term plan.

Will there be a service of blessing for the pastorate and an induction for me? Yes. But we don't know when! Rev Michael Hopkins starts as our new Synod Moderator on March 1 and he will be working out a space in his diary so that he can be present. But I can start the new ministry from now onwards so that nothing is delayed.

Ukraine

Two key things to report on.

First, thank you to those who commemorated the second

Anniversary of Russia's invasion by attending either the event in

Maidenhead or the vigil in Marlow. Marking such dates is important.

In Maidenhead we made 'prayers' to hang on a tree (see below left). We also wrote messages on strips that will be attached round trench candles. These prayers and messages will be sent on to soldiers fighting in Ukraine.

We also heard music and Ukrainian songs. These can be heard on our Facebook page. Oh, and we also ate

Ukrainian food! It felt like an important



event as we celebrated what it means to be Ukrainian.

Second, what are we now collecting and sending? We are

hoping to send our next truck the week of March 18.

We know these things from Ewa:

Food. All the places we have been supporting are struggling to get food. Above all else, we need to send food. We will be spending nearly all the money we have left to send food. But the more food that is donated the better.

Easter eggs are a great way of helping people feel remembered. So we want to send as many eggs as possible. We don't want big eggs. Instead we need eggs such as crème eggs and bags of mini-eggs. These are easy to transport.

Pyjamas! There is a hospital that we can support on the outskirts of Kherson.

There are around 100 children that need this hospital due to treatment for various conditions. But they can't stay in the hospital over-night because of the risk of bombing. If we can send pyjamas, it will mean they have things to wear

during their day-stay in hospital. We need new, and very good condition pyjamas for boys and girls aged 3-13.

So, we need donations of:

Long Life Food Small Easter Eggs

Pyjamas

Can you help? Do you know of others who want to help us make a massive difference to the





lives of children and adults struggling in Ukraine?
You can donate items, or money at church, or use this QR code.

This truck may well be our last big shipment of aid.

Not because we want to stop. Not because the war has stopped. But

we know that donations are not as abundant as they were, and we have spent nearly all the money that has

been donated.

We will still get some donations, I'm sure, but it is getting harder.

'Wine to Aid' - Fundraising Evening for Ukraine

We thoroughly enjoyed the excellent 'Wine to Aid' fundraising event for Ukraine at Maidenhead on Friday 9 February.

We all assembled in the church and after a warm welcome and introduction to the Aid for Ukraine project from David, the evening got off to a great start with our talented Ukraine choir (who meet weekly at the church) entertaining us with a super selection of Ukrainian songs along with readings in such impressive English. Corks then started popping at the back of the church (that must be a first!!) as the first of the evening's wines (Cava & Prosecco) were uncorked and served to everyone.

We were so fortunate that Master of Wine Richard Bampfield hosted the evening. Richard led us through each of the six wines we tasted, carefully explaining the attributes and origin of each one, including two from Ukraine! We then all adjourned to the hall for a blind tasting of the same six wines - this time the wines were only identified by the bottle number.

Armed with our quiz sheets, we toured each of the tables to taste each of the wines once again, naming each wine in turn and answering some additional quiz questions. On a 7th table were non-alcoholic wines, courtesy of Noughty. We also enjoyed a tasty buffet of bread, cheese and nibbles – did these flavours alter the taste of the wines?

It was fantastic that the evening was so well supported. Such a great atmosphere with everyone attending mixing so well and sharing opinions about the different wines. A magnificent sum of £1,469 was raised and more people became aware of our Aid for Ukraine project!

A thoroughly enjoyable evening – very many congratulations to everyone involved in organising the event and especially to Richard Bampfield and his wife Jackie for leading the evening.

Holocaust Memorial Day

I wrote this on Holocaust Memorial Day, 27th January, a day that meant so much more to me this year. It is nearly a year since the six of us went to southeast Poland to meet those in the chain of our Aid for Ukraine project and one morning we visited Belzec. It is estimated that at this major Nazi death camp over 600,000 Jews and thousands of gypsies were exterminated.

In 1943 the Nazis then destroyed the camp supposedly to hide any evidence. So there are no buildings left, just chunks of charred remains covering the sloping ground, making it even more stark and poignant. We could see the line of the railway that had carried all the unsuspecting victims to this killing factory. The museum displays, particularly those of victims' shoes, items of jewellery and other personal effects, were truly shocking. The quotation from the Book of Job (16:18) etched into stone reads "Earth do not cover my blood: let there be no resting place for my outcry!".

At the end of last October we received the message from Johnston that Lizeni Nasho, the only female sculpture artist at Artpeace had died after a short illness. She was only 55 years old. We knew her well and we had sold some of her art in our big 2009 exhibition. This feels like the end of an era. At our church meeting on 5 November the congregation decided to send Artpeace £3000 to buy maize seed and fertilizer. Two days later the money

was paid out in Harare and we received a raft of thank you messages by WhatsApp from the artists. Here is a selection:

Mike Masedza: 'This is a great relief for AP. Thank you Marlow. God bless you!'

Shingi: 'Thank you Marlow for the great job you are doing for AP'.

Coster: 'Good news from Marlow'.

Dickson: 'Good news thank you Marlow for the donations and your efforts -may

God bless you all'. Ignatious: 'Good news indeed, thank you Marlow'.

Godfrey: 'Really good news from our Marlow friends. Thanks once again for donations'.

Peter: 'Big thanks to our friends of Marlow with the inputs donation'.

Godwin: 'Very much appreciated and thank you Marlow.'

Lovemore: 'That's good news to hear that Marlow agreed to help with fertiliser and seed money'.

The artists immediately bought seed and fertilizer. Here's another message from





Lovemore: 'It's all so happy happy today. We are about to become farmers again as well as sculpting'.

Then Mike Masedza who organizes the artists sent

us a two-minute video, thanking us for our support. Obviously I cannot share the video in this newsletter but I will WhatsApp it to you if you'd like to see it. I sent them a thank you note to let them know that we speak of them often and that we feel privileged to know them and support them.

the seeds we say thank you, thank you Marlow! God Bless You

Global climate change means that the weather patterns in Africa are getting more erratic every year. The rainy season can be delayed. When the rain finally comes, it often rains for weeks on end and the soil gets washed away.

Here Shingi is tending the young plants. This region, its farming and food supply is more directly affected by climate change than we are.

In mid-January we received the first photos from Dickson in his field (below alongside Godwin). The plants are taller than he is.

In mid-February Lovemore sent a photo of his wife and son in front of their crop.

It looks like they have had another successful growing season and the harvest will provide them and their families a basic food supply for the year.

We will receive more photos and videos in the next few weeks as all the plants are maturing and ready for harvest.

We know that we are able to cover their basic food needs

with our donations and we are grateful for this. Our donation is a lifeline for everyone at Artpeace. And I would like to say a massive THANK YOU to everyone who has supported this

project through the years.
