Church Meeting: 2 November after the service followed by sandwich lunch.


Induction of Rev Chris Parker, 20 September

Aid for Ukraine

The war continues to rumble on in Ukraine although we hear very little about it on the news as the world's attention is understandably focused on what is going on in Israel and Gaza. Russian attacks have intensified in recent weeks particularly on Ukraine's energy infrastructure which is obviously essential to keep the country running and on Ukraine's railway system which is a central pillar of Ukraine's war effort, but towns and cities including Kiev and Lviv also frequently come under drone attack. Nowhere in Ukraine is safe. Kherson and the surrounding villages where most of our donations go are shelled on a regular basis. There are reports that President Trump is now turning his attention to ending the war in Ukraine. Let's hope and pray that the talks between President Trump and President Zelensky on 17 October lead to a just peace for Ukraine. Our latest lorry of donations for Ukraine set off from Maidenhead on 8

September. Huge thanks to all those who donated goods and helped load the lorry and well as those in both Maidenhead and Marlow who regularly staff the donation sessions and pack the boxes.

We are now collecting goods for our 18th lorry which we expect will leave for Ukraine in late




November/early December. Emergency power outages have been brought in across almost all of Ukraine following Russia's intensive campaign of air strikes targeting energy infrastructure. Ewa has told us that many of the villages round Kherson were already without access to electricity. As winter approaches, Ewa has asked us for blankets, new or in very good condition, charging stations,



power banks, candles, rechargeable camping lights with a power-bank. We have added these items to our list of goods needed – see new list on page 13. As you will see,

we have included a link to a rechargeable light which comes with a power-bank, but any similar lights would be most acceptable.



Candlelit Vigil for Peace in the Marlow church garden

Listening to conversations at both churches, it is clear that many of us regularly feel a sense of helplessness when we watch the news and see what is happening around the world, but particularly in the places which top the headlines such as Israel and Gaza, Ukraine and even our own country where there seems to be a rising feeling of mistrust and misunderstanding between communities leading at times to unrest and injustice.

Many have been asking how we



can share our concerns with the wider community and show that we care. We are not alone in feeling this way. We learned that River Church, Marlow were having similar conversations and also felt the need to do something. We therefore decided to join together to hold a candlelit vigil for peace in the Marlow church garden at 6.30pm on Sunday 19 October. We publicised the event widely as we were keen for this to be a community event.

In spite of the torrential rain, around 40 people turned up. The leader of River



Church, Anthea Wratten, opened the vigil with a few words of explanation of why we were there and invited those present to stand together in silent prayer or reflection. Rev Chris Parker closed the vigil

with a prayer.

We will be holding another vigil at the same time on Sunday 26 October, 2 and 9 November. Please spread the word. We would love you to come and join us. Bring your family, neighbours and friends. All are welcome.

Open the Book – 25 years on



It all started in Bedford in 1999 as a millennium project.

Dave Todd recognised that children didn't know Bible stories and he yearned to change that. He believed that if there was a way to bring Bible stories to life for children in

a way that was engaging, interactive and fun, it would make a difference. One evening, he gathered a group of Christians who had experience working with children and in schools. Dave unveiled a giant cutout of a lion that he had made, and asked the group, 'How are we going to tell the story of Daniel in the Lions' Den?' Since then, Open the Book, as it became known, has grown beyond what anyone ever imagined. There are now more than 7,500 Open the Book

Storytellers who comprise more than 2,500 teams. These teams go into over 3,000 primary schools across England and Wales. This means more than 360,000 children are hearing Bible stories regularly in their school assemblies. Open the Book is also growing in another 18 countries spread across Africa, Latin America and the Middle East.

As invited guests hundreds of volunteers, in creative Storytelling teams, use the Open the Book programme to prepare and present 10 to 15-minute scripted Bible stories to school assemblies, involving the children as much as possible. These teams have created lasting memories, sparked the imagination, given hope, taught important lessons, connected generations and touched the hearts of countless young people and their teachers.

Please pray that Open the Book, part of Bible Society, continues to flourish, to sow seeds of faith in young lives and to share these important, timeless stories over the next twenty-five years and beyond, even as the landscape of our world changes.

The team I belong to consists of members of at least four churches in the Maidenhead area, so if you have an hour or so available on a Wednesday or Thursday afternoon during school term times I know people who would love to hear from you.

Church of England Initiative "Love and Faith"

Maidenhead URC has signed up to a national ecumenical group called *Inclusive Church* which fosters equality and inclusion in churches. Currently the Church of England is running an initiative called Love and Faith. Inclusive Church have prepared a letter for their members in the Church of England to consider signing. You can only sign it yourself if you are a member of the CofE, but you may want to share the letter with your CofE friends. An extract from the letter is below.

Recent surveys and votes in General Synod have consistently shown that the majority of those within the Church of England now seek greater inclusion and affirmation of LGBTQ+ people. It is not right that these voices remain unheard,

nor that the Church continues to inflict the pain of exclusion and rejection on LGBTQ+ people, their friends, families and allies.

The Living in Love and Faith (LLF) process has received significant investment of time, money, prayer, theology and discernment. It has engaged deeply with scripture, tradition and reason, whilst seeking to also listen to lived experience. We do not support coercion or silencing of any view, but rather commit to open, honest and compassionate dialogue that honours individual conscience and fully hears the call to love one another as Christ has loved us.

We call on the House of Bishops to offer leadership and direction that honours the inclusive majority of the Church of England and truly values LGBTQ+ people. We speak now, not in defiance, but because we live in love and faith, believing that the Church is at her best when we love courageously and listen deeply. We stand together in faith, hope, and love trusting that the Holy Spirit will lead us into all truth.

beautiful prize-winning dahlias. They added a real splash of colour to our harvest display. We sold off the dahlias and the non-perishable goods after the service and raised a magnificent £90. We have now donated the money and the non-perishable goods to One Can. Many thanks to Paul for delivering the donations to their High Wycombe warehouse. It is good to know that our harvest gifts will help those in need in our own local community.

News from Mission Aviation Fellowship

Working in partnership with hundreds of other Christian and relief organisations, MAF enables practical help, physical healing and spiritual hope to be delivered to some of the world's most remote and inaccessible communities.

Since October 2024, a floatplane - in partnership with the Sustainable Development PNG Programme - is serving the isolated water communities in



Papua New Guinea, especially in and around Lake Murray.

PNG's largest lake spans some 250 square miles but has no access to any major roads, leaving it cut off from the rest of the country. Over 14,400 people

live on Lake Murray's many islands and around its shoreline and hundreds of lives have been transformed for the better by this plane that lands on water. Chad Tilley, MAF floatplane pilot says:

'It's difficult for people to access services in the area and throughout the province.

To get to Boboa, where there is a basic health centre, is far and very difficult to travel by canoe. To get to the town of Kiunga, where there is a hospital, takes five days by boat. Thanks to its water landing capabilities and speed, the flight takes 22 minutes.'

Esthel Babare, Head of Usukof Primary School & MAF passenger says: 'Growing up, it was a struggle to travel on the lake in the rain, wind and sun. When I needed stationery, it took me days to get these materials from Kiunga.

Now it's very easy for us because the water plane comes right to our doorstep.

School materials are now flown directly to the village and school matters are dealt with in Boboa or Kiunga as quickly as possible. 'I can't express my gratitude to MAF. It's a brilliant idea to provide this service for us and I thank you for this golden opportunity.'

Floatplane pilot Chad Tilley also transports barramundi fish to Kiunga Town in the plane!

Max Gom, fisherman and MAF passenger says:

I send my barramundi catch to Kiunga through the

floatplane, where it is sold at a good price. This money

helps me and my family sustain our living.
